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1. A Note From The Executive Director

This report is written with deep gratitude to God, you, our community of supporters, funders, family, friends, and the visionaries who have stood with us since day one. It is our first official record of SaveOne Southern Africa (SOSA), and it carries the heartbeat of a ministry that exists to serve those who suffer silently.

In South Africa, abortion is legally accessible. Yet for many women, young and old, the aftermath of that decision is devastating. Guilt. Shame. Regret. Depression. Suicidal thoughts. Loneliness. These are not just words; they are the lived realities of those who feel they cannot speak, grieve, or heal openly.

Recovery, if pursued, is rarely quick. It's a long, winding road often met with misunderstanding and judgment. Some are told to "get over it." Others are condemned altogether. But this is where SaveOne steps in - with open arms, gentle words, and a mission of healing that refuses to look away.

SaveOne began in Nashville, Tennessee, birthed from Sheila Harper's own pain and redemption after abortion. Her story reached me at a divine intersection in my own journey, and in 2021, SaveOne Southern Africa was born. I knew, without a doubt, that this was God's call: to begin the work in South Africa and carry it into our neighbouring countries.

The need is staggering. Between 2015 and 2019, South Africa recorded nearly 2 million pregnancies annually. Of these, 1.27 million were unintended, and 461,000 ended in abortion (Guttmacher Institute, 2021). These are only the reported cases. If the U.S. pattern is any guide, it's likely that one in every three people in our church pews bears this hidden wound. That reality should move us - not into condemnation, but into action. Healing is needed. And healing is possible.



What follows in this report is a testament to that hope. It captures SOSA's journey from August 2021 through the close of 2024. Our greatest joy and constant focus have been the healing and recovery classes, intimate spaces where transformation begins. In 2024, we reached a new milestone: hosting the very first SaveOne International Summit on the African soil. What a moment of awe and humility for all of us.

We have served people across religious, cultural, and social statuses - because pain doesn't discriminate. And neither does grace. We pray this report ignites your passion for this ministry and encourages you to stand with us in the years ahead.

To every supporter, prayer warrior, and partner - thank you. We wish you a restful holiday season, a joyful Christmas, and a radiant 2025.

We have no mouth with which to thank you.

2. Divine Confrontation: The Beginning of SaveOne in South Africa

For our first official report, we chose to share a story, not just statistics and milestones, but the very heartbeat of how SaveOne Southern Africa found its home. By the time you read this, perhaps we're still in the early chapters of our journey, or perhaps we've already spread into the SADC region and beyond. Wherever we are, may these words give you a glimpse of the humble beginnings and the undeniable grace that has carried us.

I write this not only as the Executive Director, but as someone whose life was deeply marked by the pain this ministry seeks to heal.

In September 1978, I had an abortion.

I was about to complete Form 5 - the equivalent of Matric in South Africa. I had dreams, plans, and a promising future I could almost touch. But those dreams were shaken when I found myself pregnant and unsure of who the father was - my boyfriend at the time, or the "uncle" who had betrayed my trust by raping me.

In that moment, all I could see was my future slipping through my fingers. I wasn't ready. I was devastated, terrified, and ashamed. I chose to end the pregnancy. At 16 weeks, I found a doctor in Lesotho - where abortion was (and still is) illegal - who was willing to perform the procedure for R30.

Upon completion of my exams, I spiraled. The guilt was heavy. The shame unbearable. I had no one to talk to and no way to process what had happened. I judged myself harshly - called myself a murderer. The joy of completing school was swallowed by this secret that stole every reason to celebrate. Then, that December, everything changed. I encountered the love of Jesus at a Youth Alive Ministry Camp. It was there that I was made new, truly. The shame lifted. The guilt washed away. I found the freedom and courage to embrace a second chance in life.

Life moved forward. I got married. I had children. But in 2021, the past came calling - not to haunt me, but to commission me.

I was watching DayStar TV when the Lambs were speaking about the rights of unborn children. They welcomed Sheila Harper to the show, a woman who had also experienced the trauma of abortion and the deep emotional aftermath. Out of her pain, she birthed a ministry - SaveOne - devoted to healing others like herself.

That moment was my divine confrontation. God was clear: "Tell your story. It's time." And I knew then that He wasn't just calling me to heal. He was calling me to help heal others - to begin a movement that would reach across South Africa and beyond.

3. “Pain is Painful”: The Moment We Spoke Out

“Pain is painful.”

That was the theme that echoed through Change Bible Church Sandton during Women’s Month in 2021. Pastors Jabulani and Grace Khoza handed over the entire August service schedule to the Ladies Ministry, giving women space to speak, reflect, and minister from places of real, lived experience. Each presenter shared her own story - stories marked not just by physical pain, but by emotional wounds, trauma, and ultimately, healing. God was glorified, not in perfection, but in how He had used every scar to shape them into the women they are today.

We took time to reflect on the courage of the women South Africa honours every year on Women’s Day for the bravery they displayed on the 9th of August 1956. These women had reached their limit. They could no longer bear the weight of silence, and they marched. It was a divine confrontation with injustice, and it changed history.

Inspired by their legacy, we too, felt it was time to confront the silent struggles that have loomed large in our society for far too long - one of the greatest being the pain of abortion. The emotional fallout. The quiet shame. The pain carried in secret. We knew the reality: abortion is happening everywhere, across every layer of society. And still, so few are talking about the emotional aftermath, whilst many others act as if all is perfect, hiding behind a carefully kept façade.

So we decided to speak. To break the silence. To tell the truth, not in condemnation, but in love and vulnerability.

We took to the virtual space and opened our hearts to anyone willing to lend an ear - those who honoured our invitation and leaned into the conversation with compassion and courage.

In one of those virtual sessions, I, Mpho Masienyane-Khauoe, stood with my husband, Dr. Jonas Khauoe, beside me. I shared my testimony - my shame, my redemption - under the theme “Out of the Rubble of My Life.”

We were joined by people whose presence reminded us that we were not alone. Sheila Harper and her husband, Pastor Jack Harper, attended from the USA, along with SaveOne’s international coordinators, Tim and Kristy Hall, and their families. Sheila shared the vision of SaveOne - and in that moment, the ministry officially launched in Southern Africa.

A few days later, I was told that another young woman in our very own congregation had a story to share. Her name was Leletu Ekunimmo. With her husband Olawale standing faithfully by her side, she spoke about her own abortion journey and the healing that followed.

Here we were - two women, sitting in the same church, carrying the same secret - and neither of us knew about the other.

That’s how deeply abortion stories are buried. That’s how powerful silence can be.

But not anymore.

Today, that brave young woman is not only my sister in Christ - she is my colleague, my friend, and a fellow director at SaveOne Southern Africa. Together, we carry this vision forward. Together, we speak - because pain is painful, but healing is possible.

4. The Vision of SaveOne

The vision of SaveOne is to help individuals and families recover from the negative effects of abortion.

In South Africa, abortion is legal and easily accessible. Every year, thousands of unwanted pregnancies end this way, each decision shaped by complex, often painful circumstances. But what we speak about far less is what happens afterward: the quiet suffering, the emotional unraveling, the deep and personal grief that many carry alone.

This pain is not always visible. It shows up in silence, in sudden tears, in broken relationships and heavy hearts. It contributes to our country's growing burden of mental illness - not in headlines, but in hospital waiting rooms, therapy sessions, and tear-stained pillows. As Vincent Peale so profoundly wrote, "Many people suffer not from what they are eating, but from what is eating them." Many women are being eaten from the inside by regret, shame, embarrassment, depression, and suicidal thoughts. Some live with the fear that they will never be whole again. Some reach a breaking point. And some, heartbreakingly, do not survive the weight of what they are carrying.

But this pain does not belong to women alone. Parents suffer too, especially those who pressured or insisted their daughters terminate a pregnancy. Many carry hidden guilt, wondering if they did the right thing. Men also bear this weight. Some mourn the loss of children they never had a chance to protect, because the decision was made without their knowledge or consent. Others are tormented by the role they played in forcing the abortion - whether it was to cover up an affair, silence a victim of rape or incest, or protect a reputation built on appearances. Their attempts to hide shameful truths have only added layers of pain, secrecy, and destruction.

These stories are real. They are ours. And they are everywhere.

There is much more to say - more stories, more complexities, more pain. But even in this brief section, we hope you understand why SaveOne exists. This is not just about a procedure. It's about people. It's about the weight they carry in silence. And it's about offering a safe, loving space where healing and restoration is possible.

5. The Strategy

Our strategy at SaveOne is to reach people at every level of society, wherever they may be. From places of worship to schools, businesses, communities, and the marketplace, our aim is simple: to spread the message of healing and recovery to anyone who needs it.

But we don't stop at recovery. We also work to contribute to prevention. This means equipping people, especially young people, with the knowledge and support they need to make informed, responsible decisions long before they find themselves at a crossroads. It's about reaching hearts before hurt takes root.

SaveOne Chapters

SaveOne Chapters are the core of our outreach strategy. These chapters, we pray, will take root in churches, institutions of higher learning, NGOs, and community-based organizations that are willing to integrate the SaveOne ministry into their existing ministries/structures. Whether it's for staff, students, members, or beneficiaries, these chapters become access points to healing.

5.1 The Church as Champion

Since South Africa's democracy began, census data consistently shows that between 70% and 85% of the population identifies as Christian, and about 40% of that population attends church regularly. This makes the church one of the most influential institutions in our nation. And so, we turn to the church, not just as a strategic partner but as a natural home for the healing work we do.

Many of the people broken by abortion already sit in church pews every Sunday. They worship, serve, and smile through deep, silent wounds - carrying secrets they're too afraid to speak aloud. These are not strangers to the church. They are the mothers, daughters, leaders, and members who need a safe place to begin again.

That is why we believe the church must be more than a sanctuary. It must be a place of healing and restoration.

The Christian faith upholds powerful values of love, support, grace, forgiveness, and restoration. These are not just theoretical concepts - they are the very heartbeat of what SaveOne offers through our healing classes. The SOSA curriculum is grounded in these truths, making the church a natural partner in our work. Our approach is supported by scholars such as Gerrie Ter Haar and Stephen Ellis, who affirm that any meaningful development strategy must consider the role of religion in society. The church is more than a spiritual authority - it is a space of influence, connection, and transformation.

5.2 Schools Ministry

Our young people are growing up in a world full of rights - but very little understanding of responsibility. Many become vulnerable to exploitation through unhealthy relationships, including rape, incest, or transactional encounters with older men, often referred to as "sugar daddies." In many cases, these girls fall within the legal category of minors. This makes sexual relations with them not just unethical, but criminal.

While the justice system has a role to play in prosecuting such crimes, our role is different. We are here to create a space where young girls can heal. We want to walk with them through recovery and help them reclaim their identity and worth. We also want to engage with these learners in practical ways to help prevent pregnancy in the first place and to inform them on the negative effects of abortion. The latter is important because those who choose abortion do so with the expectation of relief, peace and moving on with life as usual afterwards.

5.3 Campus Ministry (Universities and FET Colleges)

Institutions of higher learning are full of promise - and pressure. Thousands of young people, newly independent, face a flood of temptations and distractions that can sometimes lead to unwanted

pregnancies. Abortion often feels like the only option. But many who choose it find themselves facing the very struggles we've described: shame, confusion, depression, and isolation. This is why our presence on campuses is so critical. We meet students where they are, with understanding, not condemnation. The aim is to offer them a path back to themselves.

5.4 SaveOne Everywhere

It is not enough to operate in pockets. The need for healing after abortion is everywhere - and so, SaveOne must be everywhere too. Our dream is to see recovery classes available across communities, corporates, campuses, congregations, and beyond.

Note: While the core of our healing curriculum remains the same, our materials are adapted to suit different environments. Outside of church settings, our content is set to be different in tone unless it's used within Christian student organizations such as SCO, SCM, Scripture Union, and others.

6. Communication

As we continue to grow, staying connected with our community becomes more important than ever. We are committed to keeping in touch with our stakeholders, partners, donors, funders, and the many supporters who walk this journey with us. While the frequency and format of our communication will evolve as our capacity grows - both in terms of finances and human resources - we remain intentional in doing what we can with what we have.

For now, we are doing our best to keep our social media platforms active with updates, announcements, and moments that reflect the heart of our work. These platforms serve as windows into our mission and movement. We are also grateful to SaveOne USA, who have graciously hosted our presence on their main website. Through this space, we've had the joy of connecting with people who found us via the international office, and others who discovered us through different platforms and networks. These early connections are sacred to us. Each message, each inquiry, each conversation is a reminder that this work is reaching the hearts it is meant to - and that more healing stories are waiting to be written.

6.1 Conferences

Conferences form an important part of our communication strategy. They bring together all our stakeholders to reflect on successes, share challenges, and learn from one another. These gatherings also offer encouragement and a sense of shared purpose. We believe they play a key role in building fellowship and maintaining accountability as we continue to grow.

6.2. Activity Reports

6.2.1 Laying the Foundation

The first step in establishing SaveOne Southern Africa was for the convenor to identify potential team members who could contribute their time and resources to help bring the vision to life.

In August 2021, SOSA was officially registered with the Companies and Intellectual Property Commission (CIPC) as a Non-Profit Company (NPC).

Soon thereafter, the organisation was granted Public Benefit Organisation (PBO) status - a key development for individuals and businesses considering financial support. As a registered PBO, SOSA is able to issue Section 18A tax certificates, which allow donors to claim their contributions as tax-deductible with the South African Revenue Service.

We have also applied for Non-Profit Organisation (NPO) status with the Department of Social Development (DSD). This registration, once approved, will enable SOSA to be listed with DSD and become eligible to apply for government funding in support of our work.

6.2.2 Recovery Classes: Our First Steps

Following SOSA's registration, we successfully completed three recovery classes. Two more are currently in progress, and one class, unfortunately, could not be completed. Our very first class remains our largest so far - with three participants. Two completed the journey, while one dropped out after three sessions, sharing that she felt she had received the healing she needed. The remaining classes have each served one person at a time. We are deeply grateful for every single SaveOne moment. The healing of the one strengthens the ninety-nine.

Of the completed classes, two were held online and one was a hybrid of online and in-person. The two ongoing classes are also being conducted online. The class that was discontinued took place in person.

These first 41 months of SaveOne Southern Africa have been foundational - laying the groundwork for what is to come. We believe that 2025 will mark a season of growth, building on the steady, faithful steps we've already taken. *Thoto e tiea tseleng*. (Much gets clarified as the journey unfolds.)

6.2.3 Marketing the Ministry

One of the most time-consuming but important activities in our early days was reaching out to church leadership and media to introduce the SaveOne Southern Africa ministry. In this effort, we sent out over 200 letters to church leaders - mostly within South Africa, but also to a few in neighbouring countries. We also sent approximately 15 letters to NPOs, around 100 to friends and family in the medical profession, three letters to legal firms, and a few to SABC radio stations and one television station. The response was small, but significant. All the written communication was followed up by calls. We are grateful to our volunteers who did everything "as unto the Lord". Because it was.

Since 2021, we've had the opportunity to share the SOSA story across a variety of platforms: eleven churches, one high school, one TV station, two universities, one church conference (representing multiple churches), one NPO, and one Christian leadership structure. In each case, we spoke either to the full congregation, to the leadership team, or both. To all of them, we want to express our deepest gratitude. They took a chance on us. They opened their pulpits, their classrooms, their platforms - even when we were still finding our feet. They contributed to our journey and gave us the space to grow, to learn, and to begin becoming what God has called us to be.

It is not everyone who wants to walk with a ministry in its infancy. Many prefer to partner only once the vision is well-formed and the structure well-established. But these early partners stood with us when things were still unfolding. Their questions challenged us to think deeper. Their words affirmed that,

indeed, the Lord had said yes to the birthing of SaveOne in our beautiful land. What follows is a list of all those who extended a hand of welcome during our early days - listed in no particular order, and grouped by geographic area:

6.2.4 Chapter Launches

To date, three church chapters have been launched. Change Bible Church Sandton and Care Bible Church Midrand were the first, launched in that order before the summit. The third, Change Bible Church Katlehong, was launched on the first Sunday following the summit - on 29 September 2024.

The next step is to ensure that the surrounding communities are made aware that these chapters are now

active and ready to offer healing classes. There is still much work ahead in spreading the word and building the necessary support structures, but the foundation has been laid.

7. Campus Ministry Begins

Our efforts to enter university spaces have led to an open door at Tshwane University of Technology (TUT), which has eight campuses across South Africa. Some early work has already begun, and we are hopeful for deeper, more fruitful involvement in 2025.

We've encountered a good kind of challenge: university policy requires that any initiative introduced on one campus must be made available on all. This has pushed us to think bigger and build greater capacity, as we work to deliver our service meaningfully across all campuses.

At the time of writing this report, we have a small but dedicated team of four life coaches, two of whom have already started engaging at two Tshwane-based campuses. So far, we have had meaningful conversations with five students.

It is a humble beginning, but as we have seen time and again, great things often start small.

8. International Summit

8.1 The Summit

The first-ever SaveOne Summit on the African continent took place from 27 to 28 September 2024 at Change Bible Church in Katlehong. It was a historic moment for SOSA, and one we embraced with deep gratitude. We were blessed to receive a visit from Timothy and Kristy Hall in April, earlier in the year. Their encouragement and support strengthened our confidence and reminded us that we were not walking this journey alone. We believe they were also encouraged to see the groundwork that had already been laid here in South Africa. Preparing for the summit was no small task. But God showed up - and by His grace, it happened.

Seven churches were represented at the gathering: Change Bible Church Katlehong, Care Bible Church, Change Bible Church Sandton, God's Family Church, Corner Stone Assemblies, Eagle Nest Assembly, Katlehong Assemblies of God, and Baptist Church Daveyton.

It was a significant milestone for us - one that followed the deeply personal healing journeys we've walked with individuals since the beginning. The summit felt like the next blessing, layered with purpose and divine timing.

We were honoured to host three incredible women from SaveOne International: Kristy Hall (International Chapters Coordinator), Bonnie Kee from North California, and Michelle Thompson from Canada. Kristy attended in place of her husband and colleague Timothy, who was unable to travel. Sadly, due to unforeseen and unavoidable circumstances, Sheila and Jack Harper were unable to join us. We missed them deeply but remain grateful that the summit unfolded in alignment with God's assignment. Kristy did a great job representing her husband and the visionaries.

The summit programme was rich and meaningful. Apostle Xola Nzo, our host, opened the summit with power and clarity. Representatives from the Departments of Police, Education, Health and Mental Health, along with Tshwane University of Technology, the Pregnancy Help Network, and several local and international guests participated in the program. Our own *truth tellers* shared their own powerful testimonies of pain, healing, restoration and hope. We also celebrated through music, with ministry from the Youth Alliance Trio from Johannesburg. Across both days, we welcomed around 60 attendees, supported faithfully by the CBC Katlehong worship team, ushers, caterers, security, and protocol teams.

We are so thankful for the prayers, the hands, the hearts, and every kind of support that made this moment possible.

8.2 Pre-Summit Practical Ministry

Thanks to a financial blessing from several of our supporters - including Change Bible Church Sandton, Lintle Community Awakening, and Firm Foundation Ministries in the USA (home to our international coordinators Timothy and Kristy Hall) - we were able to extend our ministry beyond words and into action. This support enabled us to serve various NPO initiatives in Katlehong and surrounding areas, as well as five pregnancy centres. We provided essential supplies such as cleaning materials, mealie-meal, rice, baby formula, nappies, tissues, and baby wipes. All wrapped in tons of love.

These distributions were not quick handovers. With the exception of one Pretoria-based centre that we still plan to visit, each delivery included meaningful engagement. Our team had the opportunity to listen to the staff and beneficiaries, hear their stories, and begin relationships built on trust and mutual understanding. Although our initial goal was to complete all visits before the summit, a few took place afterward. Still, each interaction, whether before or after the summit, was significant.

8.3 Post-Summit Follow-up: Blessings and Challenges

As mentioned earlier, some of our pre-summit plans, especially the distribution of supplies and outreach to beneficiaries, had to be completed after the summit. These post-summit visits became valuable moments of learning and discovery, revealing new opportunities to serve - without shifting from SOSA's core mission. These visits were carried out in partnership with one of our main sponsors, Lintle Community Awakening, who are eager to expand their reach in the Ekurhuleni area. Together, we began to see the potential for strong, meaningful partnerships between SOSA, Lintle, and the pregnancy centres that we engaged with.

One such moment stood out: a newly emerging pregnancy centre we supported responded by gifting us clothing for a baby expected in February - our first tangible opportunity for practical support in campus ministry. Lintle has also generously contributed high-quality second-hand clothing, which we've been able to pass on to both our campus and pregnancy centre ministries.

As these relationships deepen, we will also be investing in training. We've identified courses offered by the Pregnancy Network that will benefit our team, and in turn, the Pregnancy Network has expressed interest in participating in some of SaveOne's own training to strengthen their outreach efforts.

One of the post-summit visits was to Paballo Ya Bana, which had received supplies earlier. That visit concluded with an agreement to launch a SaveOne chapter at the centre - a meaningful and exciting development. We also visited a high school in Katlehong, which presents another opportunity: either to launch a chapter directly within the school or to establish a partnership that allows us to refer learners in need of ministry to the nearby chapter for support. Additionally, Leletu Ekunnimo had the honour of sharing her testimony at the Pregnancy Help Network 2024 Annual Conference.

With growth, however, comes the need for sustainability.

As we continue to reach out, the need for funding becomes increasingly clear. We cannot ask people to give of their time, skills, vehicles, and fuel indefinitely - especially when many of our volunteers are unemployed or retired and have financial needs of their own. Moving forward, we hope to offer support in the form of travel reimbursements, accommodation, and where possible, stipends.

9. Looking Ahead

As we move forward, our focus is clear and intentional. We are not chasing new opportunities - instead, we are stewarding the ones already in our hands.

- We will prioritise strengthening the doors that have already opened for ministry. These are sacred spaces, and we want to honour them well.
- We will work to build the capacity needed to serve these areas effectively and sustainably.
- We will intensify our fundraising efforts, so that we can support our team, expand our reach, and meet practical needs without burdening those who serve.
- And above all, we will continue to walk with faith and action, trusting God every step of the way.

Our journey is far from over. But if these first chapters have shown us anything, it's that the One who called us is faithful. He will complete the work He began.

10. Conclusion

We have truly seen the grace of God at work over the past few years. For every experience - both the joyful and the difficult - we are deeply grateful. We carry forward what was good and build upon it. And from the challenges, we draw lessons that will guide us into the future.

Have we delivered on our mandate? Yes.

Is there room to grow and improve? Absolutely.

And that's exactly what we intend to do in the new year.

We acknowledge that this report has been released later than anticipated. We ask for your grace and patience, and we commit to improving in the years ahead.

As we reflect, we want to thank you for walking this journey with us. Your support has been invaluable.

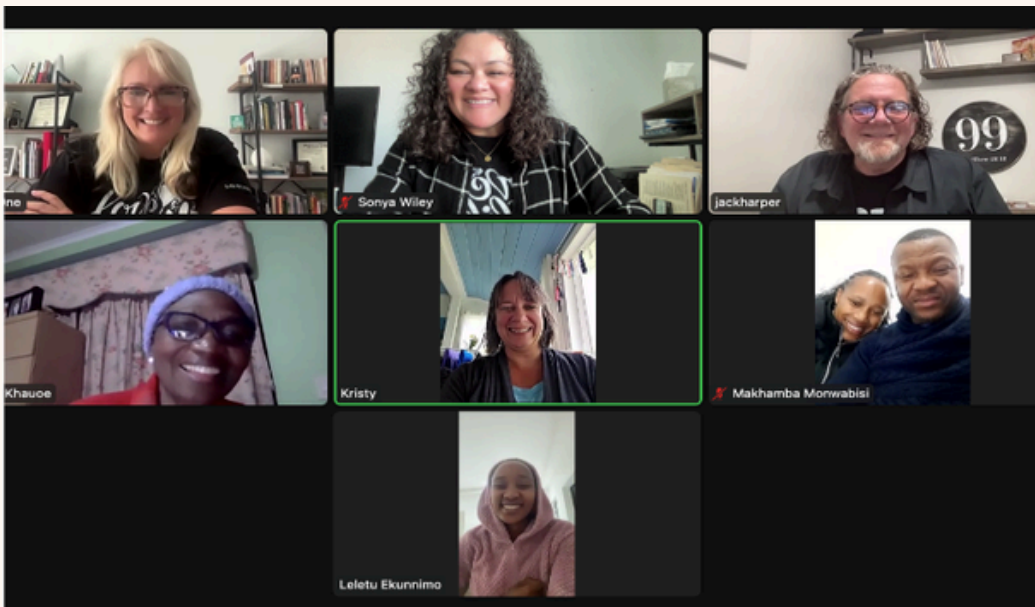

Laughter and movement filled the space as Bonnie and Mpho danced with the children, spreading joy through every step



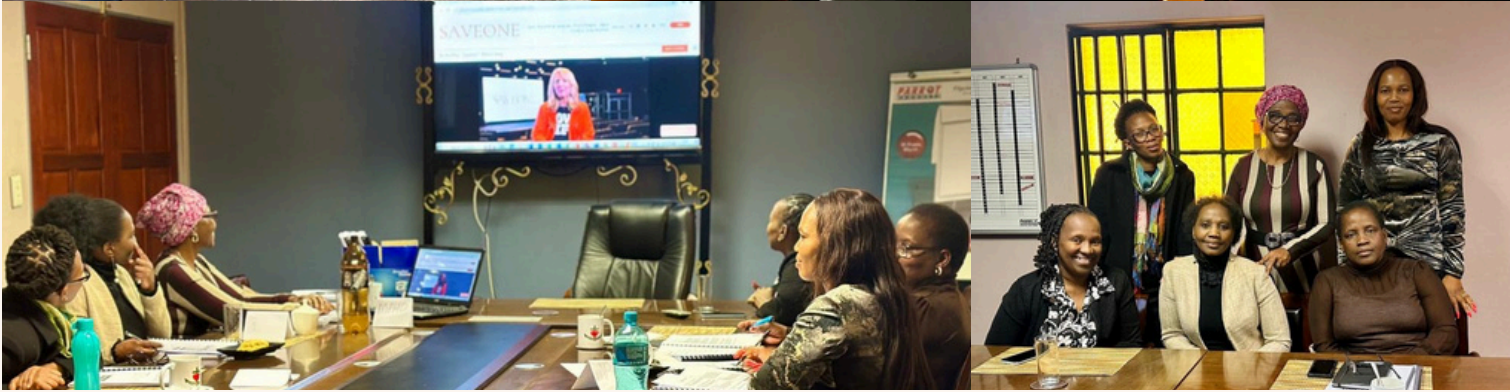

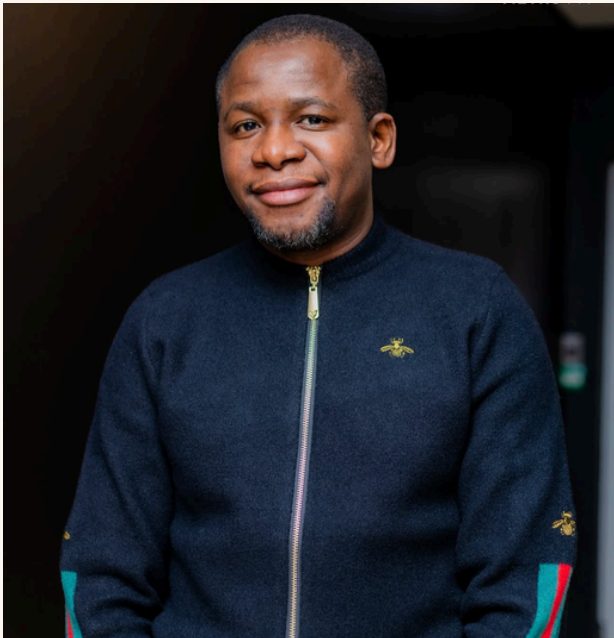
